Any claim for release must be made by: July 2008
[No later than 15 working days after the date of seizure notice]

The Authority may be of the opinion that it is necessary to retain the property for a period of time for investigation or criminal proceedings.

A seizure authority may sell, destroy or otherwise dispose of seized property where:
(a) the claim period has ended and no claim has been made or
(b) a claim was not made within the claim period but the seizure authority has determined that the claimant is entitled.

A copy of this notice has been sent to the chief constable, the registered keeper and any other person identified as a driver of the vehicle. It has also been published on the seizure authority's website.

VI. HICL RELEASE GUIDANCE - (To be included with the return notice)

1. If the seized property is a vehicle with a claim to be the registered keeper of the vehicle (the 'log book' / V5C document)
2. The person claiming the vehicle must provide proof of address. Any claim for release by sufficient information to enable the determination of entitlement to seized property of address from the list below will be required for both name and address. For example, if your name is not on the list you must provide another document such as a utility bill.

Acceptable proof of name examples	Acceptable proof of address examples
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Current signed passport • Original birth certificate (UK birth certificate issued within 12 months of the date of birth) • Full form including those issued by UK authorities overseas • EEA member state identity card (which can also be used as evidence of address if it carries this) • UK or EEA photo card • Full old-style driving licence • Photographic registration cards for self-employed individuals in the construction industry - CIS4 • Benefit book or original notification letter from Benefits Agency • Firearms or shotgun certificate • Residence permit issued by the Home Office • EEA nationals • National identity card bearing a photograph 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Utility bills issued in the last three months • Local authority council tax bill for the current year • Current UK driving licence (but only if not for Credit Union) • Bank, Building Society or Credit Union statement • Original mortgage deed for the last year • Society membership card • Purchase agreement for land or property in the last year • Council housing association rent card or notification letter for the current year • Benefit book or original notification letter for the current year • Electoral Register for the current year • Council tax demand

Proof of identity for agent companies and other

Where an agent makes the claim on behalf of themselves and their principal and by a vehicle hired by the principal and the recovery agent will be required to provide proof of identity for the agent.

ADVISORY - In compliance with Birmingham City Council's 1998 regulations regarding the prevention of seizure recovery on a public road, by a person who holds no valid insurance of a recovery vehicle.

...to produce proof of name and address of the agent. Any claim made for the vehicle from the address proofs described above.

...Crime and Disorder Act the furtherance of public circumstances where the vehicle is to be driven away, This will not apply where
