Data source details	We do not have the demographic data for park visitors i.e. park visitors can come from anywhere in the city, and even further afield (given the park's location in Worcestershire), so there is no way of telling the demographics of park visitors. This project will impact on any park user across the city that parks their car at Lickey Hills Country Park.
	This project will also impact on users of The Old Rose & Crown public house and Lickey Hills Golf Course, as the car park that serves both businesses is within project scope. Discussions will take place with both stakeholders to mitigate the impact surface improvement works and car park charging will bring. Data has been collected as part of the previous stakeholder consultation from local businesses, Lickey Hills Advisory Committee, Worcestershire County Council, as well as the District Parks Manager and Senior Ranger on site.

Please describe the impact to the age characteristic	There is a risk that older citizens may be adversely disadvantaged by the charging policy, especially those from low income households. Although we have no data to support this and this is anecdotal, this issue has been raised in the public consultation for a similar project at Cannon Hill Park in 2017. There is a risk that older citizens with low incomes may be put off from visiting Lickey Hills Country Park as a result of the car park charging scheme.  There is a risk to low income young people or families toothe car park charging scheme may put them off from visiting Lickey Hills Country Park.





How will you mitigate against any negative impact to the age characteristic?	Feedback from a previous stakeholder consultation has led to the decision to revise the chargeable period for parking i.e. car park charges will begin later than originally planned, for the benefit of dog walkers etc. This risk is also partially mitigated by the availability of a parking season ticket, as well as the availability of free bus travel for older citizens. Lickey Hills Country Park is served by effective bus routes with the numbers 98 (serving City Centre, Selly Oak, Northfield) stopping approximately 5 minutes walk from the park and the number 47 (serving City Centre, Highgate, Selly Park, Cotteridge and Turves Green) stopping within 15 minutes walk. Park users/citizens will be asked for their opinions on a suitable pricing structure and their feedback sought on the cost of season ticket through the forthcoming public consultation. Further reviews of the scheme will take place post-implementation to identify possible opportunities to further mitigate the impact on older
